he year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful years and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the Source from which they come, others have been added which are of so extraordinary a nature that they can not fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God.

In the midst of a civil war of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign states to invite and to provoke their aggression, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere, except in the theater of military conflict, while that theater has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union.

Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense have not arrested the plow, the shuttle, or the ship; the ax has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than theretofore. Population has steadily increased notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege, and the battlefield, and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.

No human counsel hath devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged, as with one heart and one voice, by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings they do also with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquillity, and union.



BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A Proclamation

1, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, the twenty-third of November 1939, as a day of general thanksgiving.

More than three centuries ago, at the season of the gathering in of the harvest, the Pilgrims humbly paused in their work and gave thanks to God for the preservation of their community and for the abundant yield of the soil. A century and a half later, after the new Nation had been formed, and the charter of government, the Constitution of the Republic, had received the assent of the States, President Washington and his successors invited the people of the Nation to lay down their tasks one day in the year and give thanks for the blessings that had been granted them by Divine Providence. It is fitting that we should continue this hallowed custom and select a day in 1939 to be dedicated to reverent thoughts of thanksgiving.

Our Nation has gone steadily forward in the application of democratic processes to economic and social problems. We have faced the specters of business depression, of unemployment, and of widespread agricultural distress, and our positive efforts to alleviate these conditions have met with heartening results. We have also been permitted to see the fruition of measures which we have undertaken in the realms of health, social welfare, and the conservation of resources. As a Nation we are deeply grateful that in a world of turmoil we are at peace with all countries, and we especially rejoice in the strengthened bonds of our friendship with the other peoples of the Western Hemisphere.

Let us, on the day set aside for this purpose, give thanks to the Ruler of the Universe for the strength which He has vouchsafed us to carry on our daily labors and for the hope that lives within us of the coming of a day when peace and the productive activities of peace shall reign on every continent.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have bereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

The Legislature have appointed *Thurfday* the thirteenth day of *November* next, to be observed as a day of PUBLIC THANKSGIVING throughout this State, and I have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Council, to iffue this Proclamation, exhorting Ministers and People of every denomination, religiously to dedicate faid day, and to spend a reasonable proportion thereof in their respective places of public worship, calling to mind the many unmeritted favors we have experienced, and with hearts filled with gratitude, to praise the name of Almighty GOD, our Supreme and Bountiful Benefactor, as the free Giver of all Good which we enjoy.

In particular, that he hath been graciously pleased to prevent contagious and mortal disorders from spreading among us:—That health is fo generally enjoyed throughout this State:—That the hope of the hufbandman hath been so far realized, as that we are favored with a comfortable supply of the precious fruits of the field: —That we are fo highly favored in the enjoyment of means for promoting ufeful knowledge: But above all, that the good tiding, of great joy, which finance to all people, is ftill continued among us, and for the hope we have of future happiness. And together with our thanksgiving, let us with humble and penitent hearts, implore pardon for our transgressions, and entreat the Father of Mercies, that he would be pleased to

continue to us, the bleffings we now enjoy, and beftow fuch favors as we may fland in need of:

That he would keep the Government of the United States, of the feveral States, and of this in particular, under his holy protection:—That our Rulers may be inspired with that wisdom, prudence and integrity which is necessary to direct them in the discharge of the duties of their respective stations, and with all the people, lead quiet and peaceable lives in all godliness and honesty:—That it would please GOD to over-rule the wars and tumults among nations, so as to subserve his own glory, and the peace, liberty and happiness of mankind :- That if it may be confiftent with his holy will, a speedy end may be put to the wars on our frontiers, the opposition (now existing in some parts of particular States) to the laws and government of the

United States, ceafe, and all further hostile measures be prevented.

That it would pleafe the LORD our Creator, Preferver and Bountiful Benefactor, to compaffionate the whole world of mankind:—That ignorance, fuperfittion, hypocrify, and every thing contrary to virtue, may be dispelled and done away:—That the divine charity of the gospel, may be more generally understood, and more universally practiced:—That a true knowledge of the LORD may operate so powerfully on the minds of all, as to produce the most ardent love to him, and good will to our fellow men: -That there may be nothing to hurt or destroy, but all unite with grateful hearts in proclaiming, The LORD reigneth let the Earth rejoice.

And it is recommended and expected, that all persons religiously abstain from all service labour, and such recreations as

are unbecoming the folemnity of the day.
